

Who is an eco-friendly chef?

Eco-friendly chefs try to use as few single-use plastics as possible (e.g., they buy bamboo straws; visit the supermarket with cloth bags; recycle; compost food leftovers at the end of the day so that they can use them in their vegetable gardens; never leave the tap running when they do the washing-up in their kitchen; try to use organic produce).

Now, you have taken on the role of an eco-friendly chef. Think of ways in which your lunch at school or on holiday could be more environmentally friendly (e.g., I bring my food in a reusable lunchbox instead of a single-use plastic container).


A letter to grown-ups titled 'Habits we would like you to change'.
